Members of the leadership team from OU host an assembly at each school to talk about what the students have learned, share with them the importance of wearing a helmet and give helmets to the students who wrote the best essays.

Each year OU strives to expand this program to reach as many second grade students as possible. This year, through generous donations from Scheels All Sports and the Siouxland Cyclists Club we are thrilled to announce that we were able to place helmets on the heads of 320 second graders in Sioux City.

"I'm very exciting to work with these individuals. They are all very independent and working on active treatment and spending more time in the community will be exciting," said Dena.
