At the National level, Mitchell B. won the gold medal in the deadlift with a personal best effort of 375 pounds. Mitchell also received silver in the bench press and fourthplace in the squat. He finished with the bronze medal overall. The competition was in New Jersey.

## **Vocational Services in the Community**

Throughout the years, Vocational Services at Opportunities Unlimited has supported several individuals receiving services at OU and has been able to help individuals learn the skills required in the modern day workplace. Vocational Services also contracts with businesses to offer meaningful employment opportunities to individuals at OU.

Currently, the Opportunities Unlimited Vocational Services department is looking to expand upon their group services. The department is looking for churches, motels, and other businesses to help grow their cleaning and sanitation services in Siouxland.

The individuals who access Pre-Vocational Services at OU can look forward to honing their job skills in an environment that allows them to work on various local contracts. Contracts that individuals are able to support include laundry for large local medical centers, church organizations, office work for various local businesses, and cleaning jobs throughout the community.

Persons served do an exceptional job cleaning the OU Community Center along with washing, drying, and folding laundry for a number of medical facilities, for whom they have been providing services the past few years.

Last April, the vocational department began working with Deanna Leech with the cleaning of her dog care center, Palace for Paws, in Jefferson, South Dakota. A group consisting of three persons served and one staff member go out weekly to keep the Palace for Paws in tip top shape. Persons served provide a variety of services from vacuuming and mopping, to cleaning/sanitizing kennels, food and water dishes. They also look forward to a short session with the dogs after all cleaning is finished.

"To be able to go out into the community is a great advantage and learning experience for those involved. They take the skills they have acquired cleaning at OU and learn to take as much pride in their cleaning at the Community Center and put it into the work they do for others," said Jason Brockhouse, Director of the Vocational Services department.


## Pollock In Place

# OU Receives the "Above and Beyond" Award

For the second time, Opportunities Unlimited (OU) has received the "Above and Beyond" Award from the Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve (ESGR).

The "Above and Beyond" Award is given to recognize employers at the local level who have gone above and beyond the legal requirements of the Uniformed Services Employment and Reemployment Rights Act (USERRA) by providing their Guard and Reserve employees additional, non-mandated benefits such as differential or full pay to offset lost wages, extended health benefits, and other similar benefits that they may incur due to training or deployment overseas.

"OU was very supportive during my multiple deployments during my 8 years at OU," said Dawn Keatts, OU's former Director of Nursing. The award is given in limited numbers by state committees to employers who have had at least one of their supervisors/managers recognized with a Patriot Award, and who have signed or agree to sign a statement of support (SoS).

"I felt supported throughout all of my deployment periods. Everyone stayed in touch with me. It's always nice to have that employer support because when you're overseas you are focused on the job at hand it's



important to know that your job at home is being supported," stated Keatts.

"We are thrilled to once again receive recognition from the ESGR as an organization," said Jeremy Pigg, Director of Marketing and Development at OU. "As an organization that provides services to military Veterans we whole heartedly support our employees in the Guard and Reserve and we are proud of their service to both OU and to our nation."

The "Above and Beyond" Award is one of only seven given by the ESGR each year and was created by ESGR to publicly recognize American employers providing extraordinary patriotic support and cooperation to their employees, who like the citizen warriors before them, have answered their nation's call to serve.

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## Prevent Sunburn This Summer

With summer upon us, we in the Nursing Department at Opportunities Unlimited would like to wish all our staff and persons served a safe summer. Sunscreen would be on the top of the list of things to have available. There is nothing that will make you more miserable for a day or two than a severe sunburn.

So, how does sunscreen work you may wonder? Sunscreen contains products combining several ingredients that help prevent the sun's ultraviolet (UV) radiation from reaching the skin. Two types of ultraviolet radiation, UVA and UVB, damage the skin and increase your risk of skin cancer. Sunscreens vary in their ability to protect against UVA and UVB. Sun Protection Factor (SPF) is a measure of a sunscreen's ability to prevent UVB from damaging the skin.

Here's how it works: if it takes 20 minutes for your unprotected skin to start turning red, using an SPF 15 sunscreen theoretically prevents reddening 15 times longer – about five hours. Most sunscreens with an SPF of 30 or higher do an excellent job of protecting against UVB. A tip for allotting sunscreen is to apply a generous amount of sunscreen to your body at least 20-30 minutes before going outdoors.

Be sure to cover all areas that will be exposed to the sun including ears, lips, hands, legs and feet. Make sure the skin is well-coated and the sunscreen is rubbed in thoroughly. The recommended amount to use is about one ounce or 30 milliliters. Sunscreen doesn't last forever, so reapply it every two hours and reapply it after swimming or sweating profusely. Make sure children as young as six months old are wearing sunscreen or, if younger, are kept in the shade. The sun's rays are always beaming down on Earth, whether it's the middle of summer or the dead of winter, so always wear sunscreen even if the temperature is a bit cooler.

Even though wearing sunscreen is a great way to protect your skin, it's not the only way and works best when combined with other measures such as wearing protective clothing and hats, and staying in shaded areas during the sun's peak hours of 10am to 4pm when possible. Let us all strive for a sunburn free summer!
